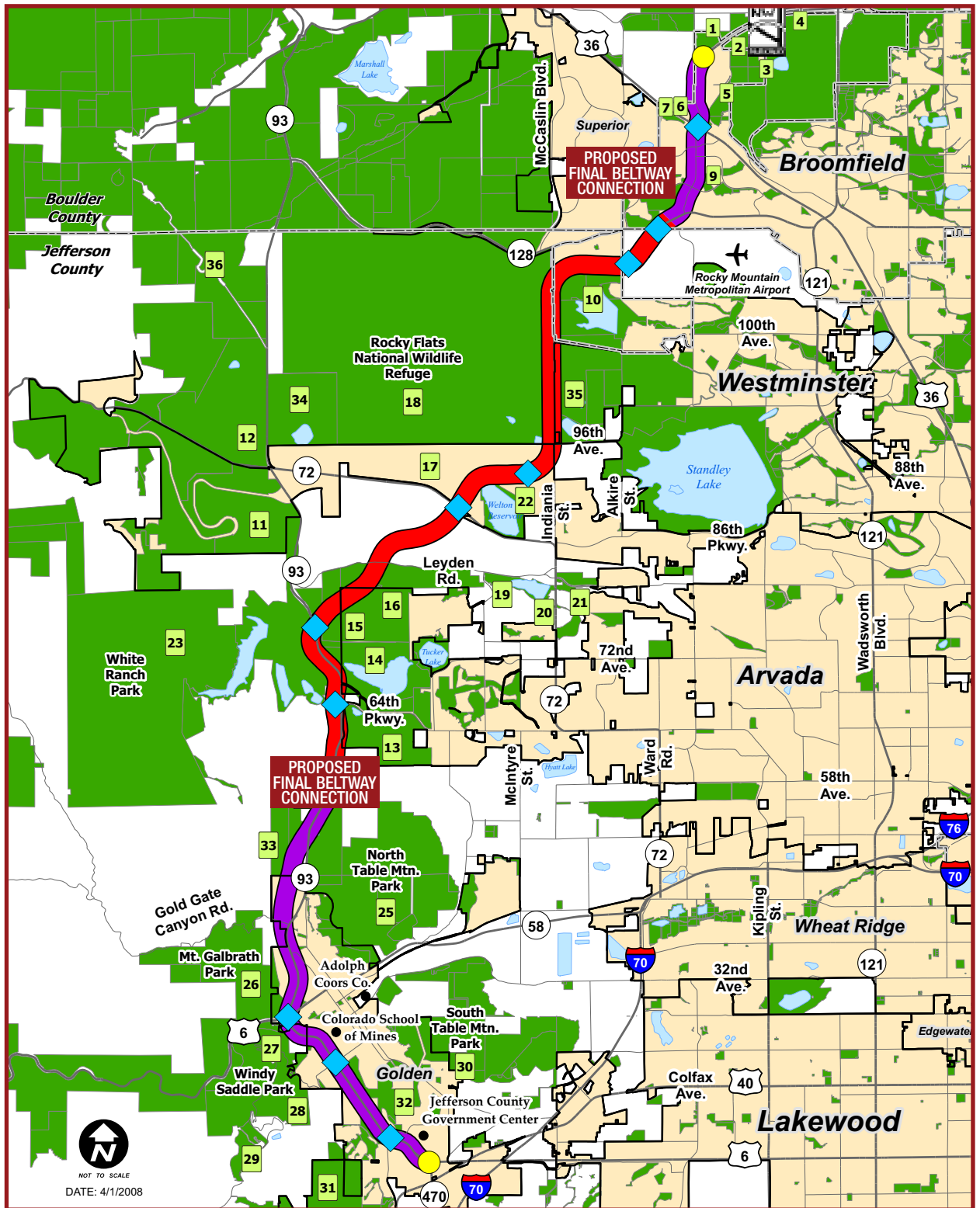


DETAILED OPEN SPACE CLOSE TO PROPOSED FINAL BELTWAY CONNECTION



1. Varra North Conservation Easement: 59-acre conservation easement purchased by the City and County of Broomfield. The easement creates a green buffer along the Northwest Parkway and preserves agricultural/open space lands. The future Northwest Parkway trail and existing trails in the Parkway Circle area provide pedestrian and bike access (2.5 miles).
2. Shirk Conservation Easement: 78-acre conservation easement purchased by the City and County of Broomfield. The easement creates a green buffer in the vicinity of the Northwest Parkway and preserves agricultural/open space lands.
3. Green Conservation Easement: 39-acre conservation easement purchased by the City and County of Broomfield. The easement creates a green buffer in the vicinity of the Northwest Parkway and preserves agricultural/open space lands.
4. City and County of Broomfield/Boulder County Jointly Owned Open Space: 2421-acres of open space jointly owned by the City and County of Broomfield and Boulder County. The lands include the Rock Creek Trail, rich wildlife habitat and agricultural lands.
5. Varra South Conservation Easement: 51-acre conservation easement purchased by the City and County of Broomfield. The easement creates a green buffer in the vicinity of the Northwest Parkway and preserves agricultural/open space lands and the Rock Creek corridor.
6. Frank Varra Park: 17-acre park site that includes ponds, Rock Creek, and trails connecting to the Lake Link Trail, Flatiron Crossing, and Superior (over 1 mile).
7. Miners Park: 2.5-acre park that includes the Monarch No. 2 Coal Mine Memorial. The park is connected via a trail to Superior.
8. Interlocken Omni Golf Course: 271-acre privately owned 27-hole championship golf course that is open to the public. A network of 8-foot detached sidewalks, 8-foot trails, and bike lanes provide for pedestrian/bike access throughout the Interlocken area. The trail system provides access to surrounding communities, the immediate area around Interlocken and the larger Broomfield community (14 miles).
9. Interlocken West Park: 8-acre parcel that is privately owned but allows for public use through a joint use agreement. The park has two ball fields, two tennis courts, picnic/shade pavilions, and on-site parking.
10. Great Western Open Space and Reservoir: 729-acres owned by the City and County of Broomfield for the preservation of open space, a reservoir and future expansion of the reservoir, a future trail to Rocky Flats and State Highway 128, and an existing prairie dog preservation area. The Rocky Flats Wildlife Refuge is directly west of this property. Westminster open space abuts the southern boundary of the site.
11. Leyden Gulch: 2,825 acres purchased in 1999 by the City of Arvada, Jefferson County Open Space, and the Denver Water Board for ~\$24.8 million. This property is a significant segment of the Front Range Mountain Backdrop in the northern part of Jefferson County. The property is adjacent to and encompasses a portion of the Ralston Buttes Natural Heritage Site. Approximately 800 acres of the site may be a future reservoir.
12. Jewel Mountain/Van Vleet properties: 1,500 acres purchased by the Conservation Fund and the City of Boulder in 1999 for ~\$9 million. The properties include expanses of unique prairie habitat and the Coal Creek riparian corridor. These properties contribute significantly to the preservation of the Front Range Mountain Backdrop.
13. Long Lakes Ranch: 430 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space, planned as a major regional park emphasizing active recreation. The master plan includes the northern Jefferson County R1 School football and soccer stadium (opening September, 2000), a championship baseball field, 15 softball/baseball fields, numerous football/soccer fields, multiple trails, playgrounds, lakes, the Churches Ranch National Historic site, and 150 acres of open space habitat.
14. Arvada Reservoir: 658 acres, including the Arvada Reservoir and over two miles of trail extending the Ralston Creek trail to Highway 93.
15. City of Arvada northern Reservoir site: 430 acres purchased by the City of Arvada in 1998, currently being mined for gravel. Eventually this site will hold several small water storage reservoirs with significant trails and wetland habitat areas.
16. Patridge Property: 394 acres of open space purchased by the City of Arvada and Jefferson County Open Space in August, 2000.
17. Candelas: 1,451 acres comprising a future mixed use development for commercial, office, industrial office, single-family residential, multi-family residential and open space. The Candelas development will comprise one of the last available sites for industrial and high-tech job developments in Jefferson County.
18. Rocky Flats Environmental Technology Site: Over 6,000 acres owned by the Department of Energy. Following clean-up and closure of this site in 2006, Congress plans to turn the site into a National Wildlife Refuge.
19. Jo Hayes property: 23 acres of open space along the Leyden Creek Corridor purchased by the City of Arvada and Jefferson County Open Space in 2000.
20. Leyden Lake: 70 acres of open space and wetlands along the Leyden Creek Corridor, under consideration for purchase by the City of Arvada and Jefferson County Open Space.
21. Pearce Property: 75 acres of open space purchased by the City of Arvada and Jefferson County Open Space, directly west of the new Ralston Valley High School.
22. Welton Reservoir: 237 acres purchased by Consolidated Mutual Water Company.
23. White Ranch Park: 4,391 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and includes Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area, the federally listed threatened species (Preble's meadow jumping mouse), significant natural resources as designated by the Colorado Natural Heritage Program, 19.7 miles of multi-use trails and two walk-in campgrounds.
24. Ramstetter West Property: Approximately 70 acres purchased by Jefferson County Open Space for the Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area.
25. North Table Mountain Park: 1,970 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and includes Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area and is under development and will provide approximately 14 miles of trails when completed.
26. Mount Galbraith Park: 871 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and includes Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area, the federally listed threatened species (Ute ladies'-tresses orchid) and 4.7 miles of hiker only trails.
27. Clear Creek Canyon Park: 3,485 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space for the scenic preservation of Clear Creek Canyon and includes the Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area, the federally listed threatened species (Ute ladies'-tresses orchid) and will have future trail development.
28. Windy Saddle Park: 892 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and includes Front Range Mountain Backdrop area and 6 mile miles of trails.
29. Lookout Nature Center and Preserve: 110 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space that includes, an interpretative nature center and 1.4 miles of hiker only trails.
30. South Table Mountain Park: 1,483 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and includes property designated within the Front Range Mountain Backdrop/Foreground Preservation area and future trail development.
31. Apex Park: 661 acres acquired by Jefferson County Open Space and contains Front Range Mountain Backdrop area and includes 8.2 miles of multi-use trails.
32. Fossil Trace Golf Club: 18 hole public golf course operated by the City of Golden.
33. Colorado State Land Board Property: This 160 acres parcel is along the hogback just north of Golden.
34. Section 16: 640 acres owned by the Colorado State Land Board. The property contains Preble's meadow jumping mouse habitat and a rare xeric tall-grass prairie community.
35. Women Creek Reservoir Authority: 492 acres acquired to protect Standley Lake from Women Creek runoff.
36. Hogan Conservation Easement: Approximately 505 acres acquired by the City of Boulder Open Space and Mountain Parks.
